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# Rhetoric & Composition

ENGLISH-101

Explores the analysis of literature and articles about issues in the humanities and in society. Students practice various modes of writing, ranging from exposition to argumentation and persuasion. The course includes a review of standard grammatical and stylistic usage in proofreading and editing. An introduction to library resources lays the foundation for research. Topics include writing analysis and practice, revision, and research. Students write a research paper using library resources and using a formatting and documentation style appropriate to the purpose and audience.



## REVISION PART ONE

Demonstrate the ability to proofread writing to eliminate sentence structure errors, verb and pronoun errors, punctuation errors, and spelling errors.



## WRITING ANALYSIS & PRACTICE

1. Read essays and articles and determine the methods of development.
2. Write essays based on personal experiences, observation, and/or assigned readings.



## RESEARCH

1. Locate and use appropriate reference materials for written and/or oral reports.
2. Produce a research paper while using the appropriate formatting and documentation style.



## REVISION PART TWO

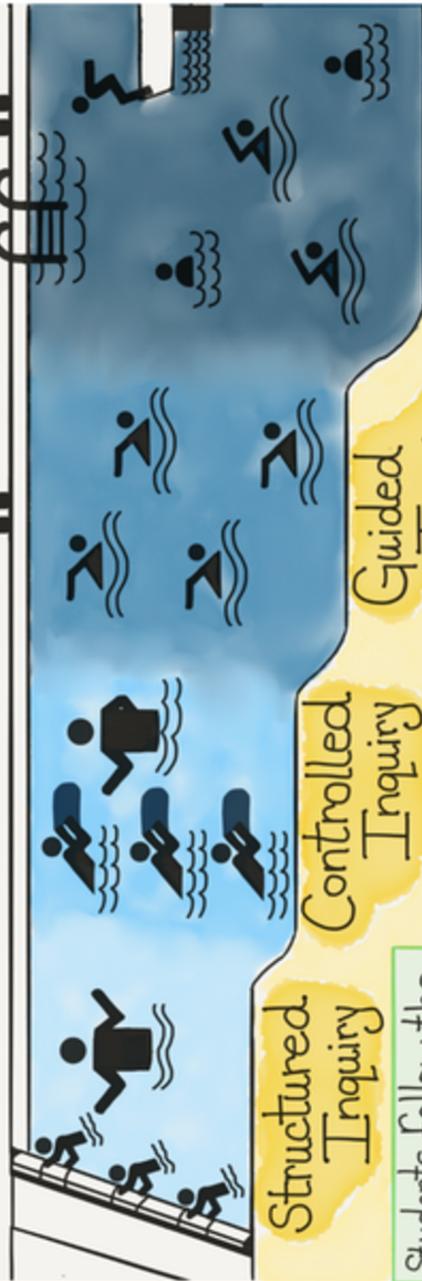

## Types of Student Inquiry

### Structured Inquiry

Students follow the lead of the teacher as the entire class engages in one inquiry together.

### Controlled Inquiry

Teacher chooses topics and identifies the resources students will use to answer questions

### Guided Inquiry

Teacher chooses topics/questions and students design product or solution.

### Free Inquiry

Students choose their topics without reference to any prescribed outcome.

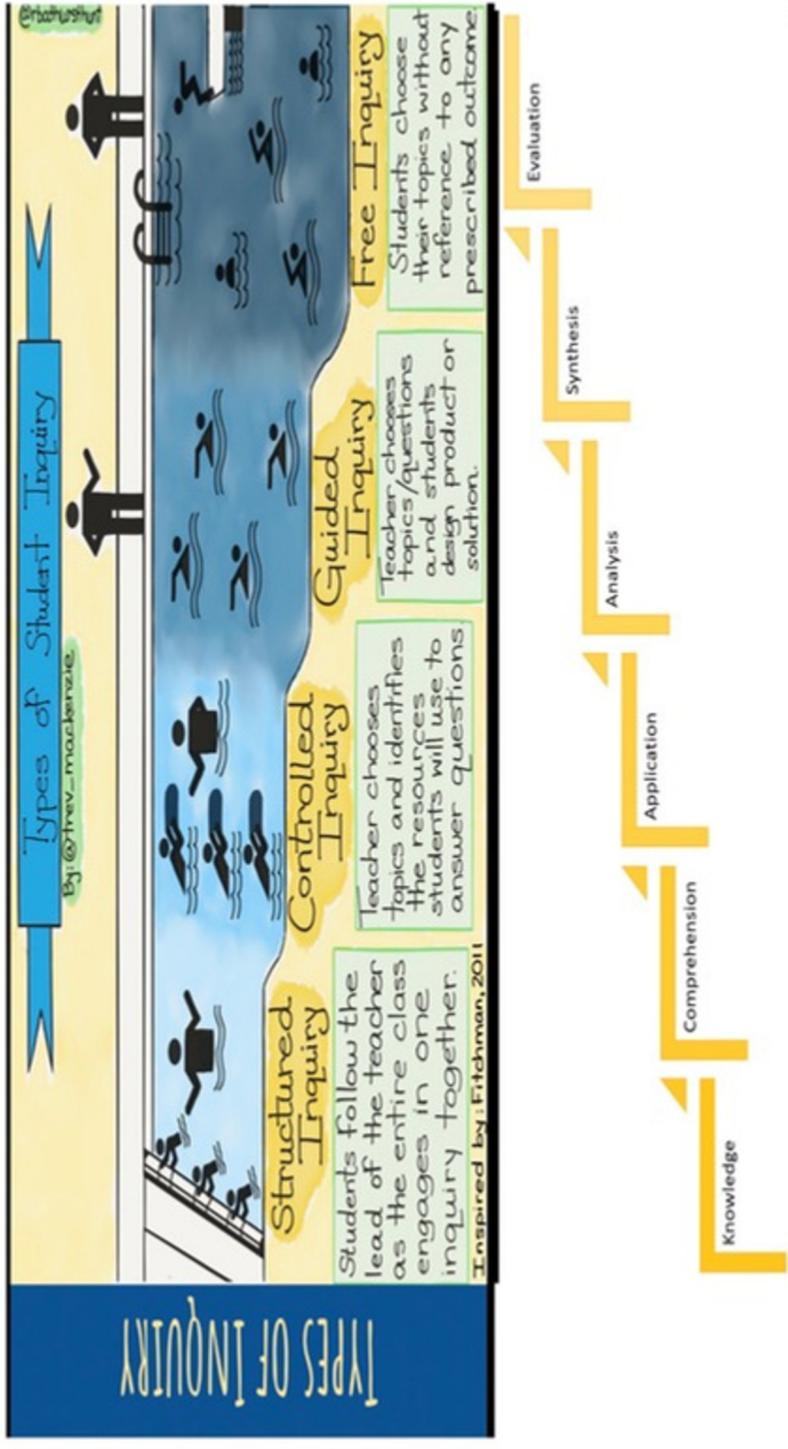

Process	<p>Students use this for mapping ideas and planning course products.</p>
Course Product(s)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Letter to Instructor: Who are you?</li><li>• Narrative Map</li><li>• Positionality Statement</li><li>• Major Writing Assignment #1: Narrative Boards</li></ul>
Course Alignment	<p>Aligns with Writing Analysis and Practice (A) by encouraging visual methods of development (e.g., mind maps of personal experiences and observations) that translate into written essays, and supports Research (C) through organizing reference materials or self-collected reflections for evidence-based writing. It indirectly aids Revision (B) by allowing iterative visual refinement of ideas for clearer, more vivid final drafts, though manual editing remains key.</p>

### COMPARE/CONTRAST & CAUSE/EFFECT

	<p>An AI-powered platform for qualitative and market researchers. It automates transcript analysis, theme identification, data organization, and insight/report generation while keeping users in control for accuracy. Visit <a href="https://ezythemes.com">ezythemes.com</a> to learn more.</p>
Process	<p>Students use this tool to find themes in their own content and others. This tool has the ability to transcribe, but students typically transcribe by hand.</p>
Course Product(s)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Media Analysis</li><li>• Community Interview</li><li>• Major Writing Assignment #2</li></ul>
Course Alignment	<p>EzyThemes supports Writing Analysis and Practice (A) and Research (C) by identifying themes in articles for Media Bias Analysis and in experiment data for Major Writing Assignment Two, strengthening products. It aids in organizing observations while students handle writing, citations, and proofreading. It indirectly improves Revision (B) through clearer insights but doesn't replace manual editing. Much of this is completed in-class.</p>

## Tool: Mariah the Scientist

### COMPARE/CONTRAST & CAUSE/EFFECT

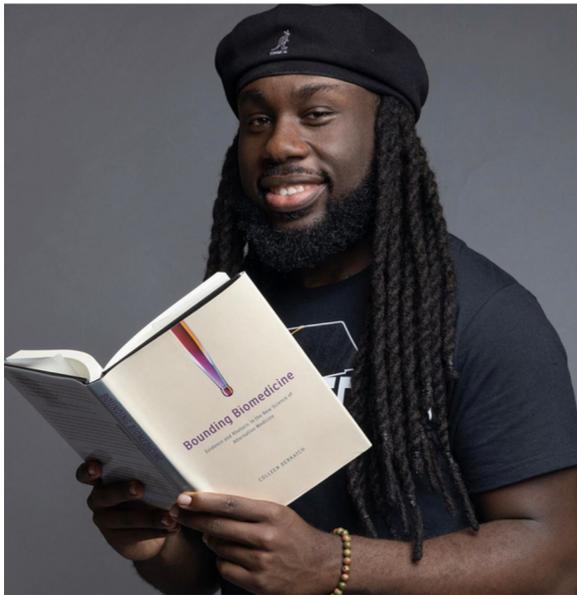
	<p>Mariah The Scientist is an AI chatbot (persona: Essay Mentor) integrated into the Blackboard course shell, designed to guide students in developing and refining their essays through structured dialogue.</p>
<p>Process</p>	<p>Students use it to discuss their current essay projects. They introduce their topic, connect ideas to class rhetoric concepts, upload and explain every reference (showing how it supports arguments and ties to class theories), respond to clarifying prompts, and ensure all points link back to citations, essay focus, and course vocabulary.</p>
<p>Course Product(s)</p>	<p>Major Writing Assignment #2</p>
<p>Course Alignment</p>	<p>It aligns with Writing Analysis and Practice (A) by prompting students to clarify focus, develop ideas from personal experiments/observations/readings, and analyze methods of development in their compare/contrast structure. It supports Research (C) by requiring location/use of appropriate sources (including Galileo, class materials, original studies), proper formatting of citations, and discussion of how references strengthen arguments/evidence. It aids Revision (B) through iterative dialogue that refines clarity, coherence, vividness, and connection of points (reducing dullness/incoherence), though students perform final proofreading and error elimination manually.</p>

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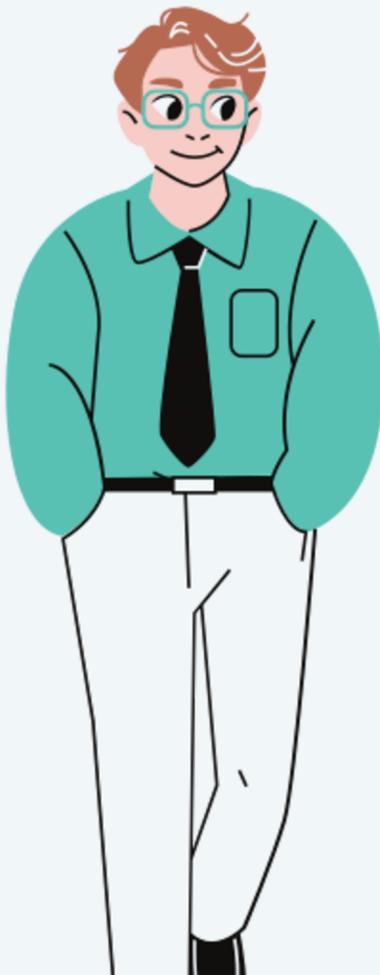
## Statement on Student Experience
